What it Takes to Be God

In part of John's glimpse of heaven, he saw four living creatures who did not rest from praising God saying, "Holy, holy, Lord God Almighty, Who was and is and is to come" (Rev. 4:8). In this saying of honor, three great attributes of God are given.

Holiness. God is the Holy One (Ezek 39:7). He is one hundred percent love and purity (Psa. 12:6; 1 John 4:8). He is total righteousness and is always right (Deut. 32:4). Truly He is "Holy, holy, holy."

"We get our bread at the risk of our lives because of the sword in the desert." Lamentations 5:9 (NIV)

I know that some folks are born, live and die in the same basic area, but Ava and I have moved many times in our life together which covers six different states. Each move involved a risk and all of the moves were made with thought and evaluation. As I look back over my life, I realize that I have taken risk at almost every turn. Moving to Newkirk was a risk that has worked out well for us. In the thirty odd times we have moved we rarely planned to move again, yet something came along that caused us to make a change. While I have enjoyed some of those decisions more than others, each of them carried a risk. We now face a new risk.

Is it over? As we reopen our community and church we are all asking ourselves the question "Is it over?" Can I really trust the State to define what is safe? The answers are worth millions. We really do not know and will not know for some time, but how long can we huddle in our homes with the nation racking up trillions of dollars of debt? Some would have us wait until we know with absolute certainty that it is safe. In reality there is very little in life that is safe, but we still take a risk and plan for the future.

We like to think that we are smart enough to know all things well in advance, but we are not. No one expects to get sick. No one expects a pandemic. No one (except for a few) plans on dying on schedule. Yet, how many of us have never been to a doctor or had a phone call at five a.m. telling us that someone has died? Parents do not plan on attending their children's funerals but countless mothers and fathers have done so. In spite of these risks, we plan for the future. Ava and I have already started working on the new schedule for our mission trip to Ukraine and if God wills, we will now go in September. We are also thinking about a trip to the St. Louis area to visit with some long time friends, family, and grandchildren.

My advice about taking the risks of reopening our community is simply this. First, TRUST GOD! Follow the safety guide lines. Wear a mask if that makes you feel more comfortable. Keep social distancing at least for a while. Support our local businesses as they try to reopen and provide services. Continue to wash your hands and to sanitize frequently. Refrain from handshakes and hugging. All this will pass. I would be remiss if I left out one more proactive thing we all can and should do. PRAY! The God who created and sustains the universe can hear, and will answer our prayers.

Therefore, confess your sins to one another and pray for one another, that you may be healed. The prayer of a righteous person has great power as it is working." (James 5:16, ESV)
