Do we remember the day when we could recall from memory a dozen phone numbers at speeds that would put that phone to shame? Yet, here we are, "What's your sister's phone number?" It may not apply to you, but several years ago, I told people that my whole life was on the computer. Now it's not only on the computer but on the phone as well and the phone is easier to get to than the computer. How many of us are at a standstill when the phone says, "No Service?"

My grandchildren, at seven and four, can do almost as much with a phone as I can. Thankfully, their parents have not given in to the temptation and given them a phone of their own.
