Many men have quit, given up, and thrown in the towel for lack of encouragement. An example of discouragement happened years ago, a minister was talking to a more experienced minister about a gospel meeting and suggested that one way to help offset the cost would be for them to trade meetings. The response was, "Well, these brethren are very particular about who preaches to them." Those condescending words discouraged and hurt. Some of life's greatest lessons are the simple ones spoken from a young man's heart with his youthful perspective. We need to find various opportunities to inspire young men to become the "Timothies" and preach.

Where are the "Davids" and "Timothies?" They are in our congregations. Find them. Use them. Encourage them.
